A Tribute to Dr. George M. Sparks Master Builder of Georgia State College

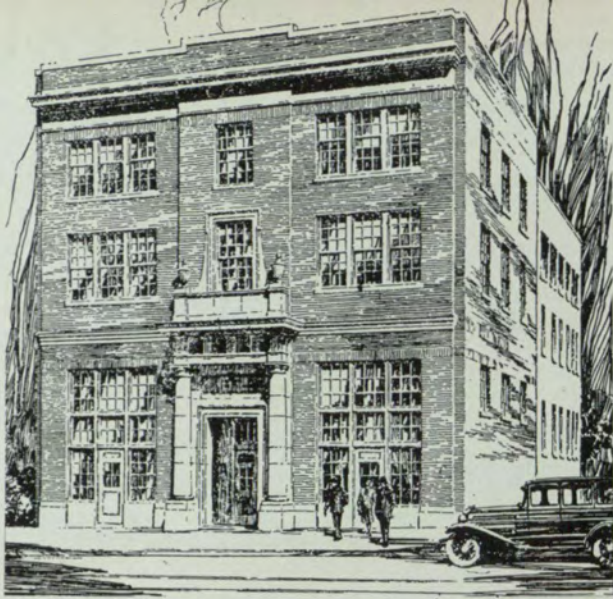
Dr. George McIntosh Sparks, President of Georgia State, is retiring after 29 years as head of the college.

Dr. Sparks is a man of two careers. Before coming to Georgia State and starting his distinguished career in education, he had built himself a career in Journalism. He had been Sports Editor and City Editor of the "Macon Telegraph." He had been a war correspondent covering the U. S. Army hunt for the Mexican bandit Pancho Villa. He had covered the First World War from Washington and had written books about his Mexican border experiences and some World War I

histories. He has been in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Journalism, International Who's Who, and Who's Who Among American Authors. He is currently in Who's Who in America.

George M. Sparks was born in Quitman, Georgia on November 19, 1889. He moved to Macon, Georgia when a boy and graduated from Lanier High School there. He attended Mercer University, which is also located in Macon. He excelled in English and history, played on the basketball team, belonged to the Dramatic Club, and was President of his class. He holds a Master's degree and a Doctor of Letters from Mercer.

After graduation from Mercer he went to work for the Y.M.C.A. and worked on the side as a timekeeper at a local factory. His work with the Y.M.C.A. led to a job with the "Macon Telegraph." He met and married Miss Mary Booth from Fitzgerald, Georgia. Dr. and Mrs. Sparks have four children, three of whom are living, Junelle, Charlene, and Robert.

Dr. Sparks has seen the college through many changes in address and name. He has also seen the

college through many hard times, once during the depression he mortgaged his home and borrowed on his insurance to pay salaries and utility bills for the college.

The college has gone under the names of: the Georgia Tech Evening School of Commerce, the University System Evening School, University System Center, University Extension Center, Atlanta Extension Center, Georgia Evening College, Atlanta Junior College, Atlanta Division of the University of Georgia, and finally, Georgia State College of Business Administration.

In the early days the college occupied rooms on the upper floors of downtown buildings. Some of the places occupied were the Walton Building, the Peachtree Arcade, a building on the corner of Pryor Street and Auburn Avenue, 106½ Forsyth Street, a building on Spring Street, and in 1931 the college moved into its first home at 223 Walton Street. This building was bought, through Dr. Sparks efforts, at no cost to the state.

The college later moved to 162 Luckie street. The next home was a garage building at 24 Ivy Street. The Ivy Street building did not cost the state any money. In 1955 the state built the college the 2½ million dollar air conditioned building on Gilmer Street.

To the students, alumni, and friends of Georgia State, Dr. Sparks, the "Master Builder," is Georgia State. To many, the college will not seem the same without Dr. Sparks. He took a college with 525 students and 6 upstairs rooms and built it into the largest college in enrollment in the state, the largest business college in the South and the sixth largest in the nation.

Dr. Sparks will carry away with him the satisfaction

of a man who made his dreams come true and Georgia State will remember him as the man whom so many owe so much. He says that it will be hard to forget Georgia State, well, it will be equally hard for Georgia state to forget Dr. Sparks!

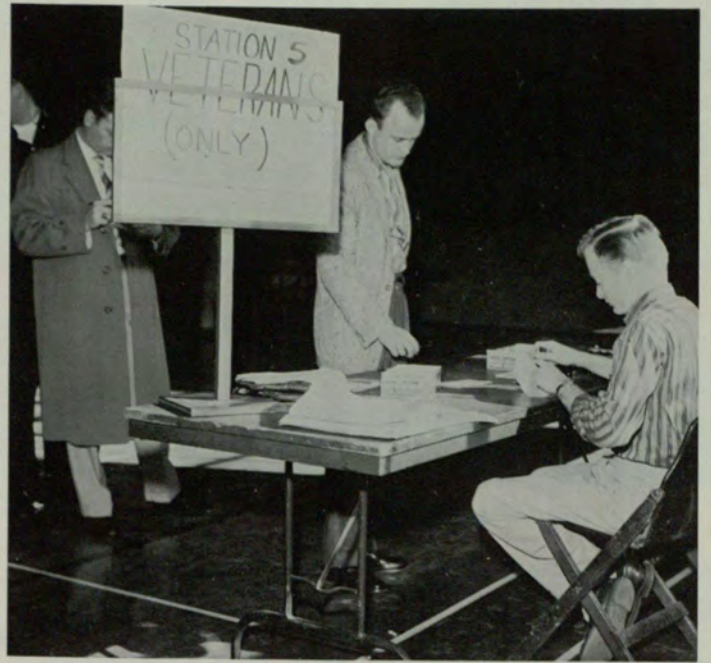

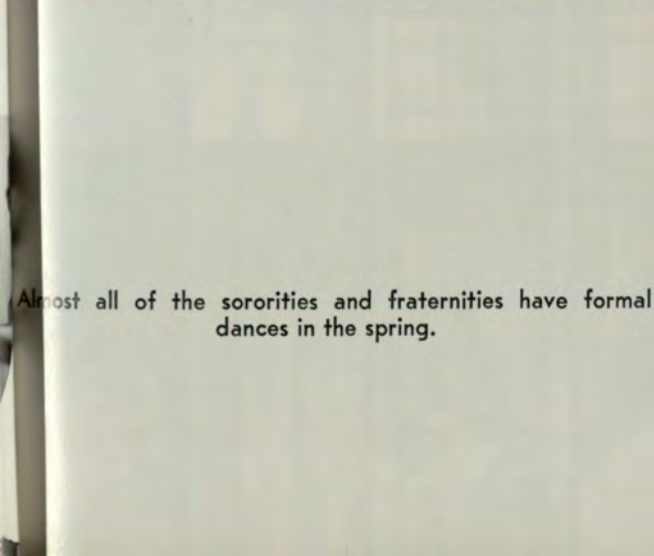

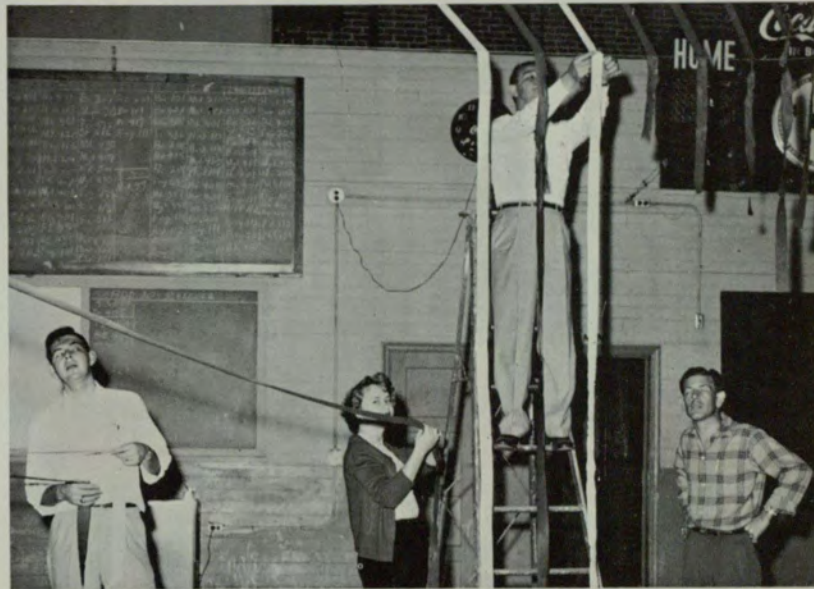

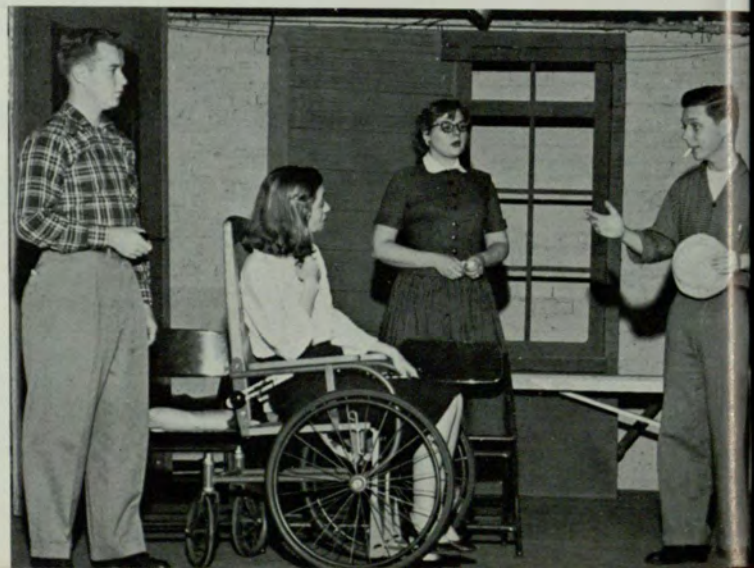

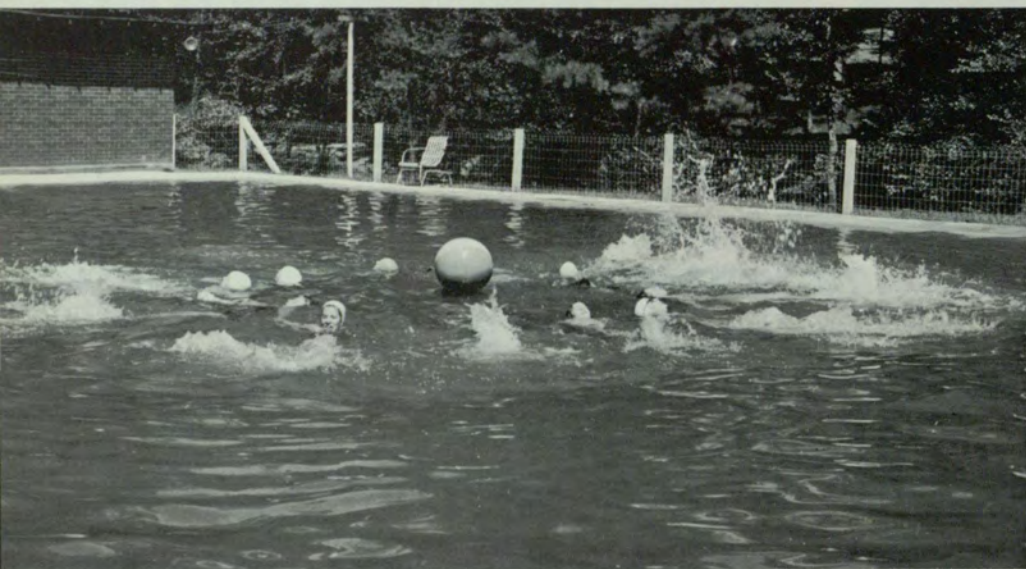

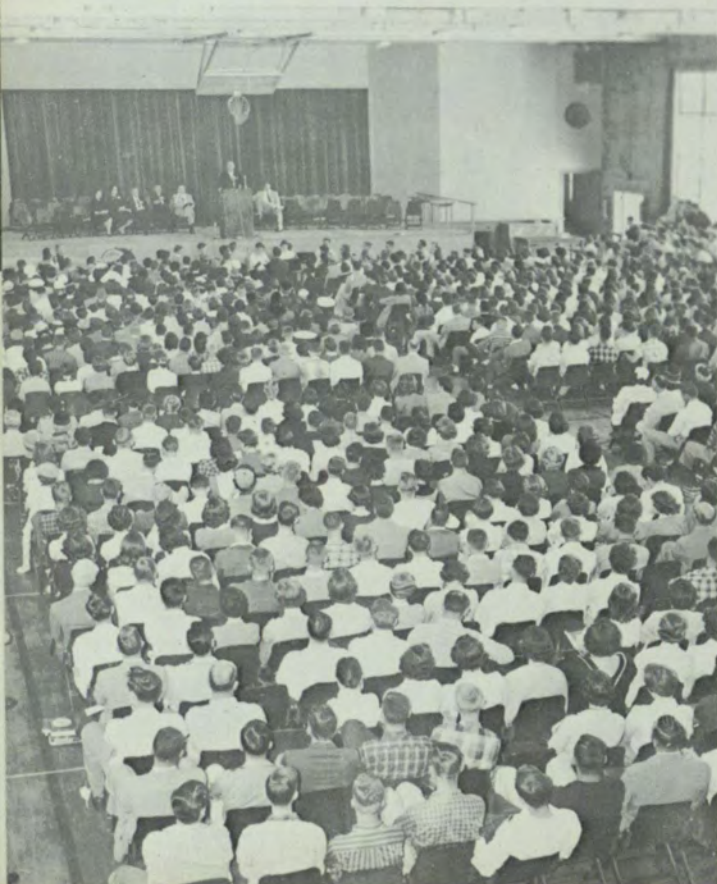

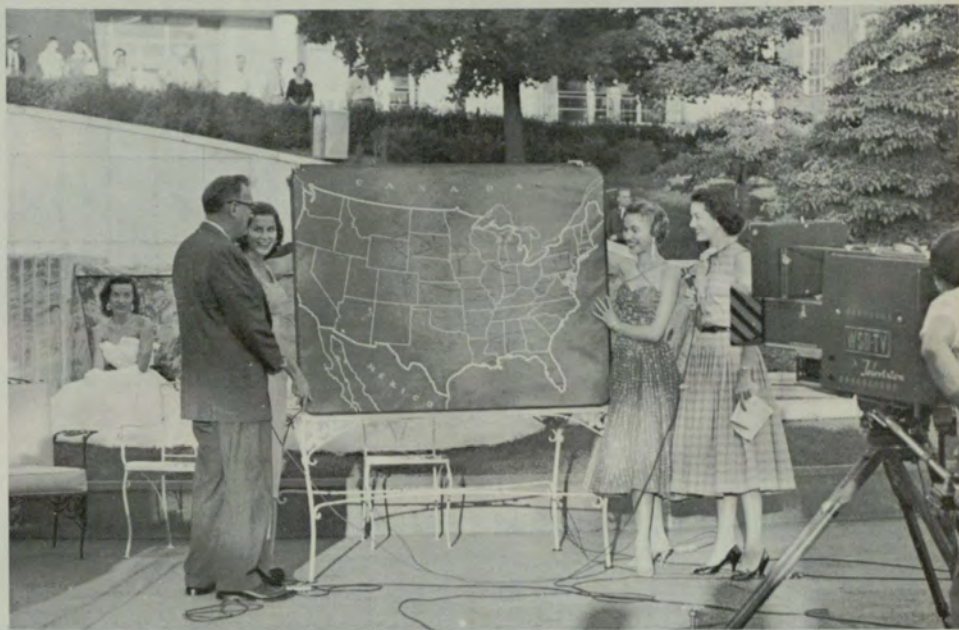

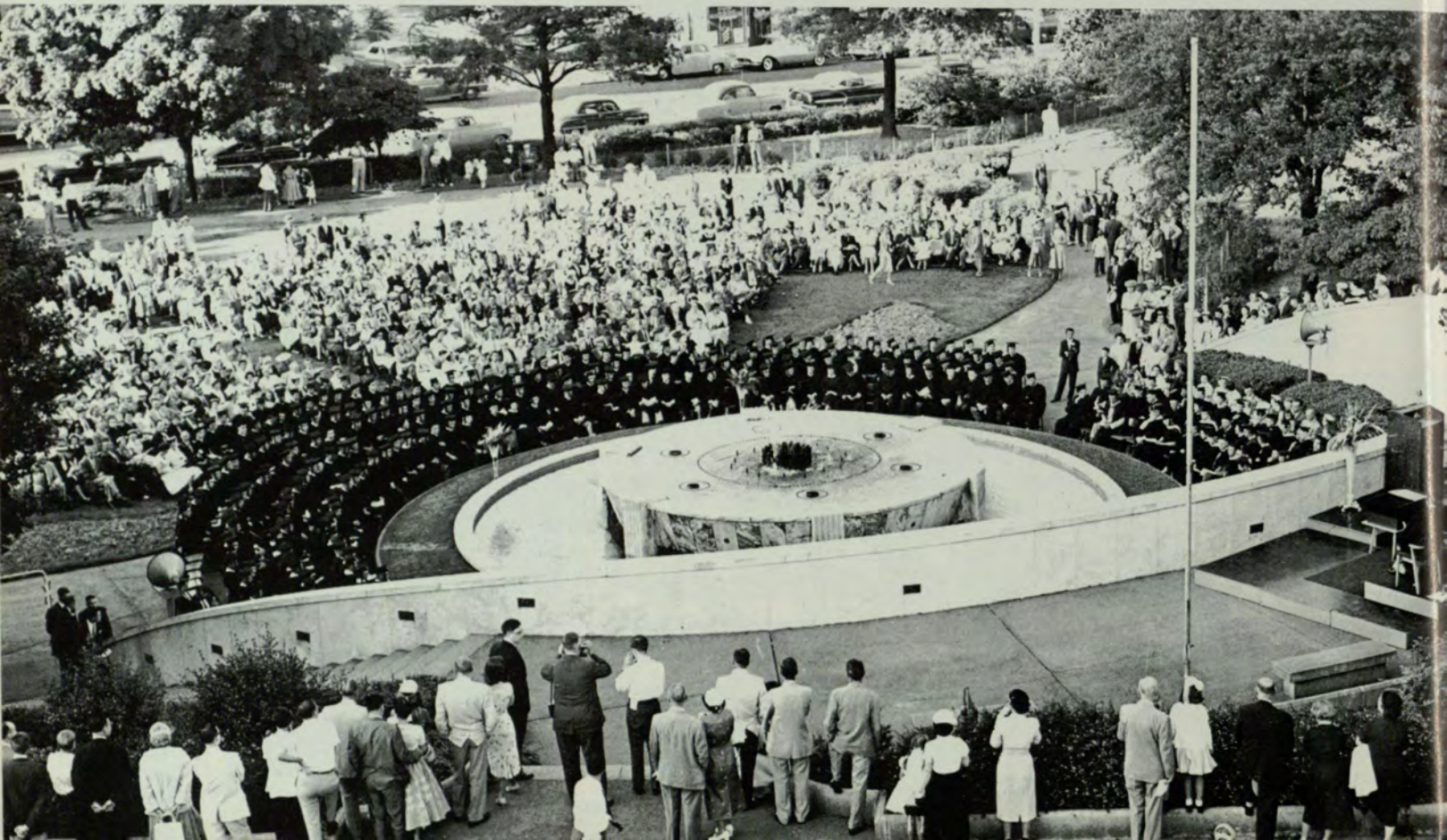

A variation, however, of two students above or below this number is allowed. 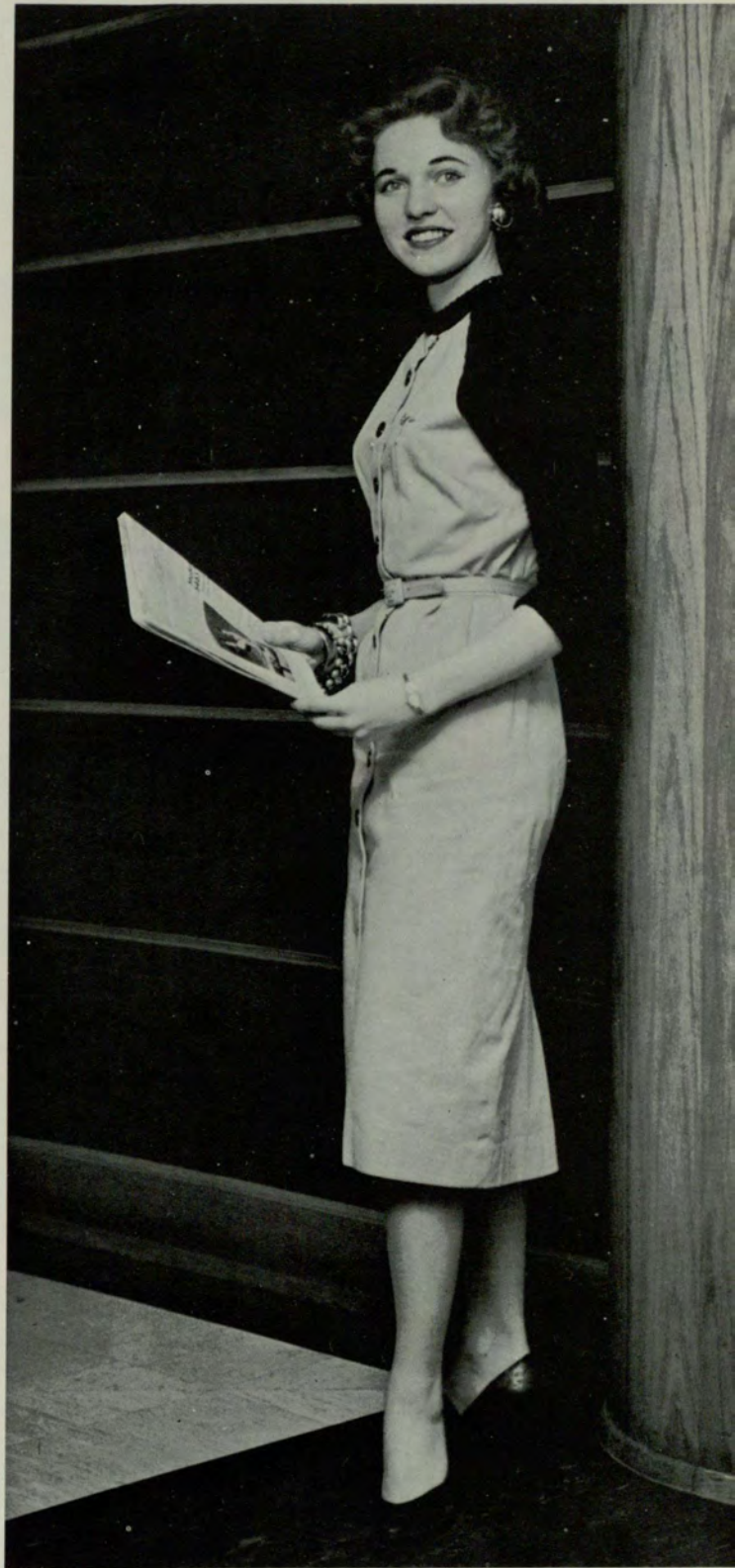
Rampway

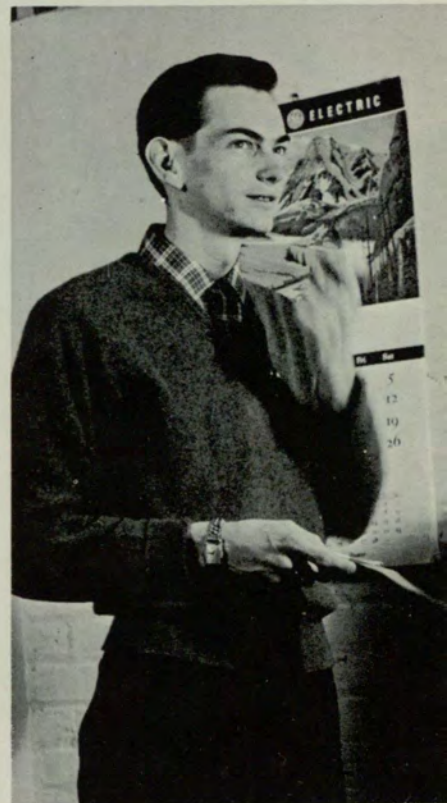

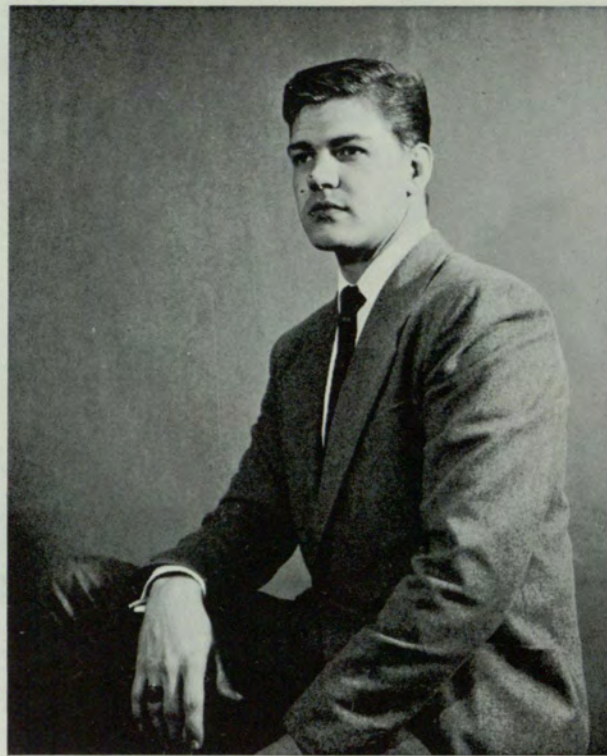

This year, the Council had the privilege of balloting the student body to select the new college colors, red and gray.

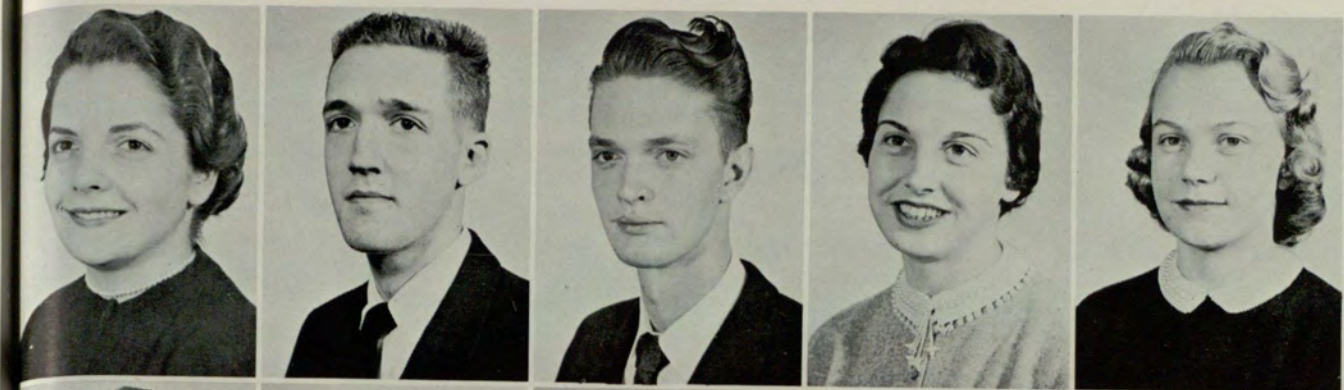

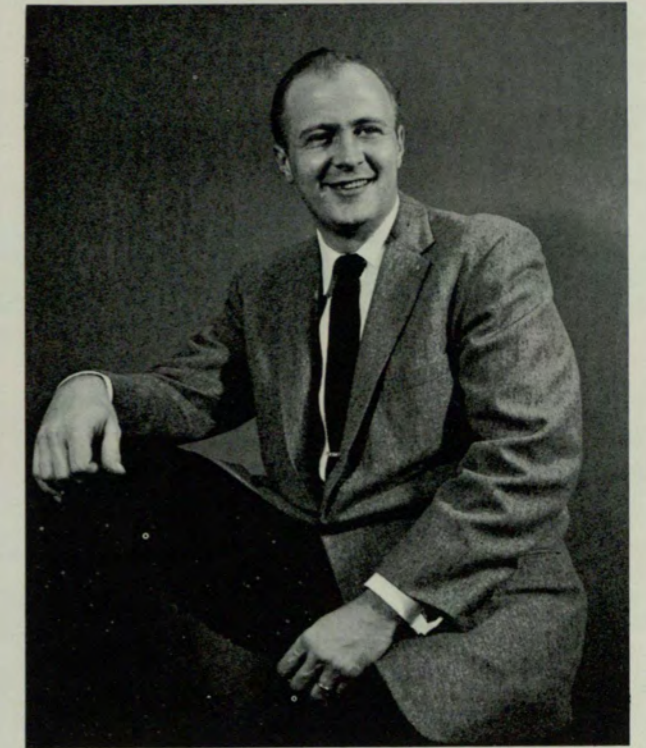


The Night School Student Council is composed of representatives from each of the night school classes. It meets each month to discuss various programs of interest affecting the night school students and their activities.

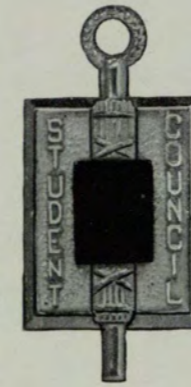
The Council was active in the Community Chest drive and in the George M. Sparks Scholarship Fund. They helped to make these two drives a success.

Delta Sigma Pi holds monthly professional meetings with outstanding guest speakers to promote a closer tie between business students and the commercial world.

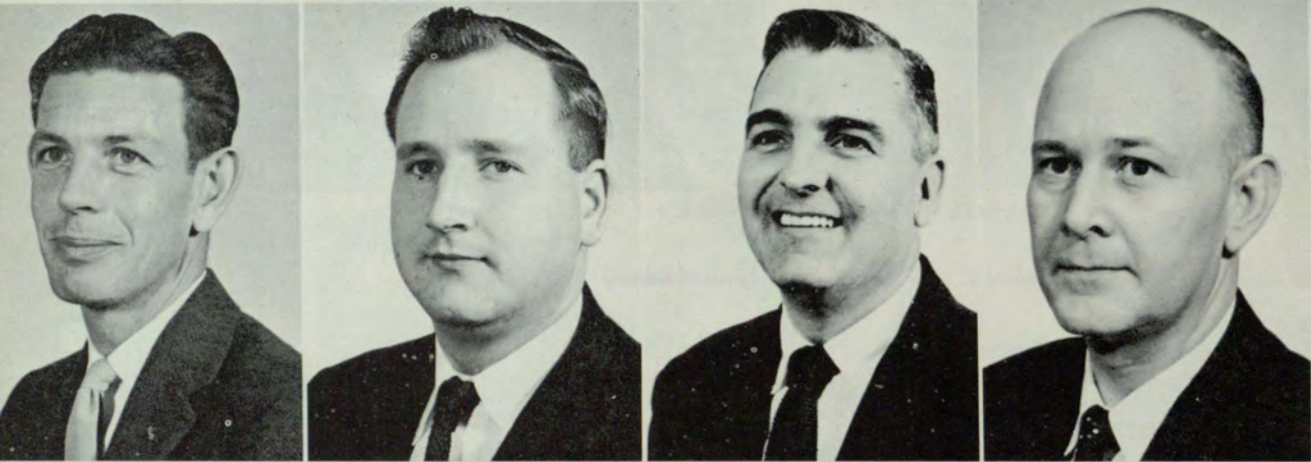

Theta Chapter, at Georgia State, was instituted on June 9, 1931. It has a restricted enrollment which signifies the high scholastic standards that this organization maintains.



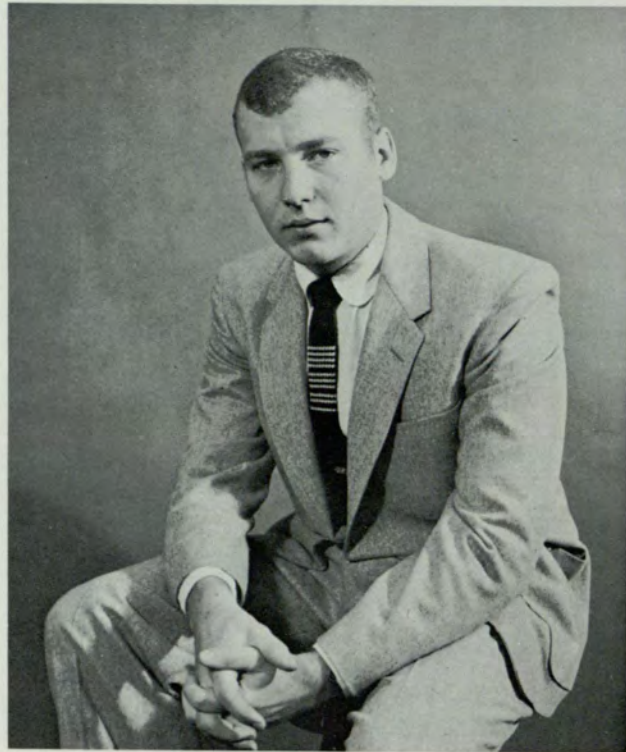

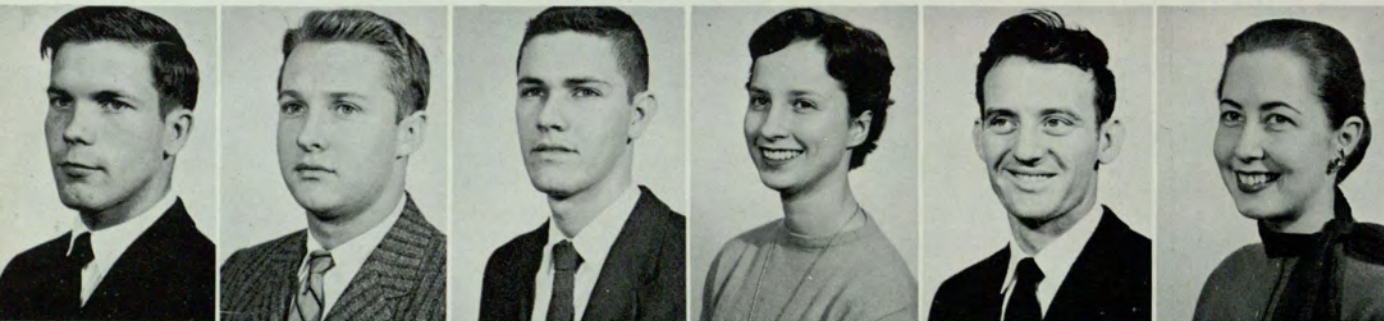
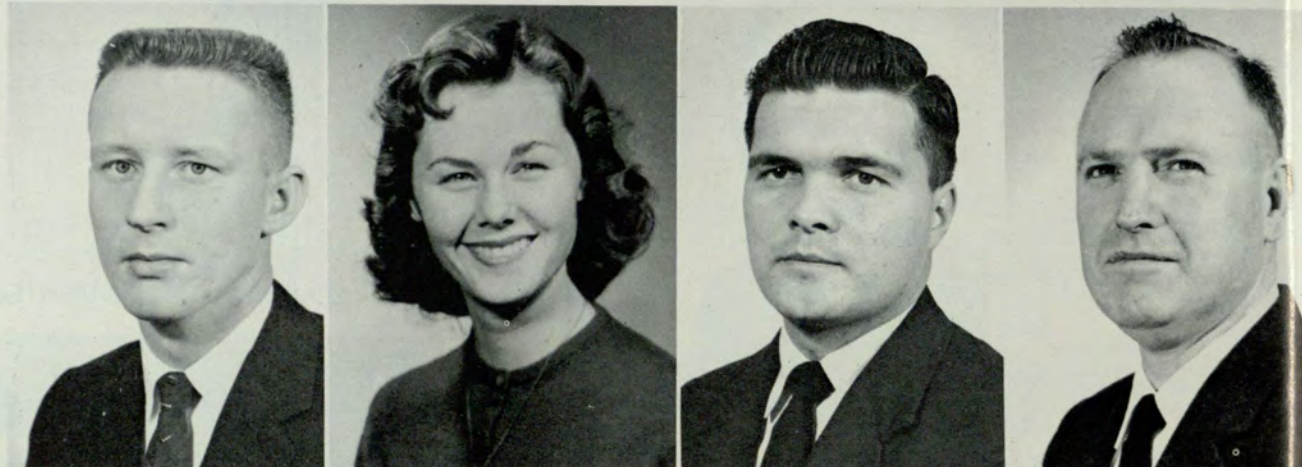
Membership in Georgia State's G Club is open to all students who have received letters for participation in or promotion of the collegiate athletic program.

The Glee Club sang at a regular school assembly on November 29, and on December 8, entertained at a school faculty party. The Glee Club also performed at the Visitors Day festivities.

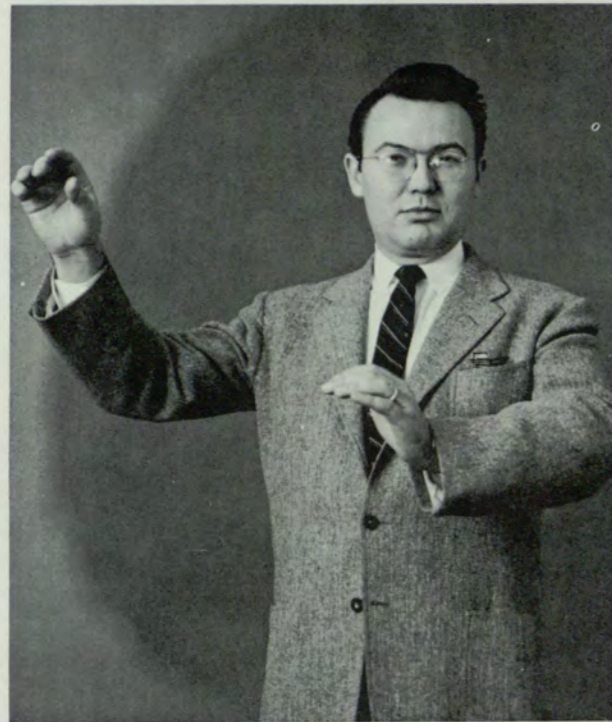

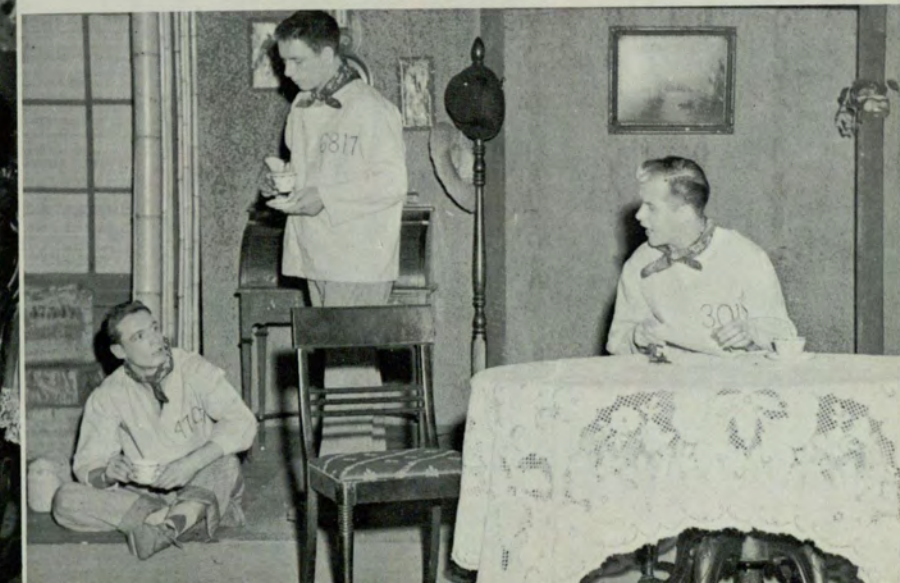

It is the purpose of the club to better serve the school and community by promoting stronger bonds of fellowship among its members as well as the student body.

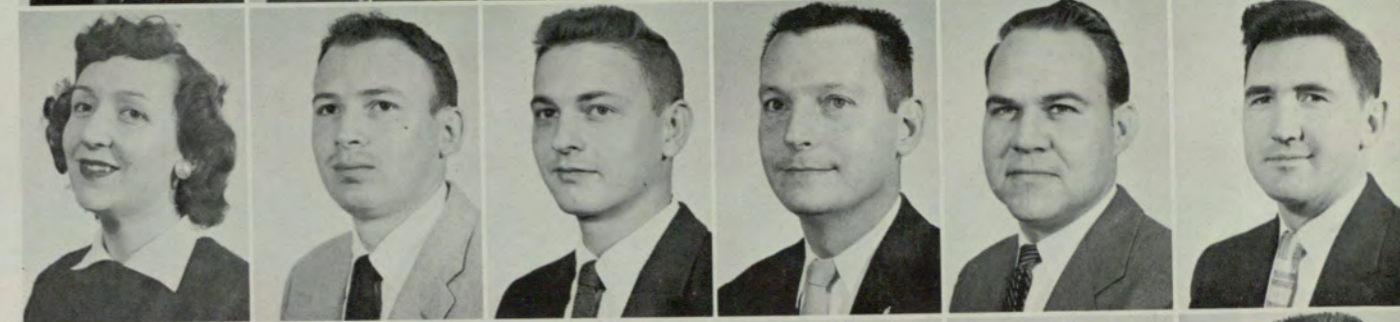

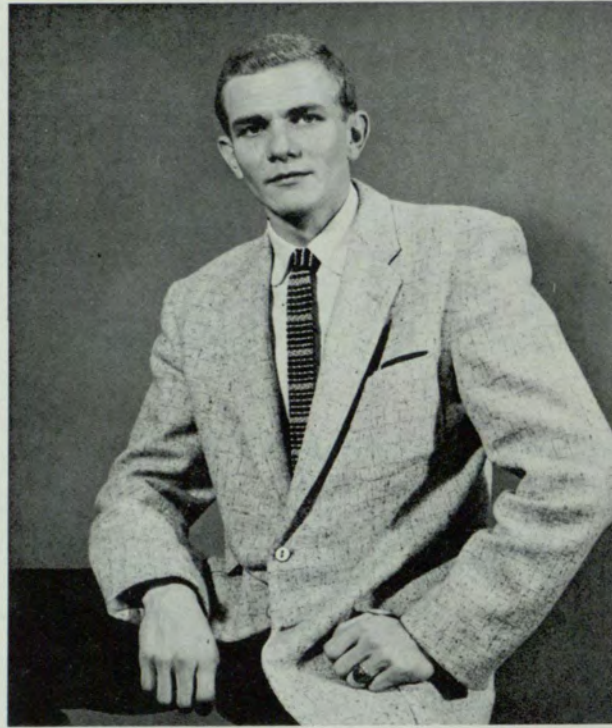
