GEORGIA STATE COLLEGE IS PEOPLE.


We, the students, are working for an education to place ourselves in a world of economics, society, and art. These buildings house our classes, our textbooks, our activities, and our people.





Georgia State's name is brought to prominence in educational television by our Classroom of the Air, a major undertaking viewed over a local TV station weekly.










For the use of the students, we have a complex, new RAMAC, a computer center, which can solve rigid physics problems and can store over five million digits of information, to be called back at the touch of a button.

Objectives of the accounting program are to develop the ability of the student to think logically, to solve business problems rationally, and to equip the student for the various careers into which an accountant may enter.



Claire Dempsey is past President of Panhellenic Council, and is currently President of Alpha Omicron Pi.


Martha Free is Editor of the Signal, after two years as reporter, News Editor, and Managing Editor on the paper.

Marilyn Heisel is President of Alpha Phi, member of Crimson Key and the Student Education Association. She has served as decorations chairman of several college dances.



Monty V. Montgomery is Chief Justice of the Day Student Council and Business Manager of the Signal. Monty is an active member of Kappa Sigma.










After food for thought as well as the stomach was all stored away safely, the job of registration began for nearly 500 new freshmen. Following registration, the class of '63 was on their way to higher education.

















The contestants were judged through personal interview by three of Atlanta's leading beauty and art consultants, who asked each of them questions about their college life and future plans.









Sigma Phi Epsilon provided music for those who were interested in trying to win a cake to swing music.




The judging took place in the Little Theatre on the sixth floor of the Ivy Street Building. The judges' choice was announced during the festivities which took place in Hurt Park.






The black academic gown is carefully adjusted, the mortar board set at just the right angle on the head, and another person awaits admission to the growing list of Georgia State Alumni.


The Dean of each School announces a name, the Assistant Registrar hands a degree to the President, and another graduate receives the statement of his academic accomplishment.

Even this is not the zenith of formal education, for ever-increasing numbers of graduates will not stop here, but will begin work on higher degrees.
































A completely new form of organization came into being this fall when the new constitution of the Day Student Council was ratified.






Composed of representatives from each evening class and the evening class officers, the Evening Student Council is the official channel of communication between evening students and the administration.




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

Carolyn Clark always maintained her smile while performing the duties of business manager.




Now they have been joined by the newlyformed majorette group which also sports the Georgia State "G." Together these girls work hard to improve college spirit through athletics.




Georgia State's Baseball troops played 16 games last year and are scheduled to play a somewhat tougher schedule this year.

Georgia State's basketball five played one of the roughest schedules in the college's history.




During the 1959 season, the Georgia State golf team had an improved season, winning half its matches.






Without a College football team, Georgia State uses fraternity football as a good and entertaining substitute.



The playoff came as a result of both Pi Kappa Alpha and Sigma Nu holding identical 4-1 records.


Sharp defensive play and breaks when they needed them gave the "Snakes" a 13-0 victory margin as well as the IFC championship.






















Intramural Basketball was played this year under the direction of the Interfraternity Council, with the men's social fraternities participating.

On campus the SPE's continually seek to maintain lofty ideals of brotherhood, scholarship, and fraternalism.
























"Through Knowledge—Power" is the Greek phrase from which Delta Mu Delta derives its purpose to promote higher scholarship among business students.


Progress and action—These are two words that can define the Pershing Rifles organization at Georgia State.

We're proud of the results; we hope you enjoy it; and we thank everyone for the opportunity to have produced this RAMPWAY '60.



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
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
