Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter of December 4. The whole tenor of your letter is that we have taken a stand which is in opposition to the public good. In the second paragraph we apparently are threatened with exposure in the national press under the urging of the Veterans Administration and Legion Posts throughout the country, and in the last paragraph there is the threat that our local office might be deprived of handling any cotton by fire inspectors, grand juries, city councils or exasperated Georgia legislators, but you fail to say what you think we will have done to incur these things. If you think anything we have done is contrary to the public good as it affects the interests you represent, we will be eager to give consideration to any proper complaint.

We too have an obligation, along with all other business interests of this country, to furnish jobs for the veterans as they return, and some of those that will probably finish in your school. We have heretofore advised you of the difficulties we are encountering in finding a location to continue in business in Atlanta. We are anxious to make arrangements with you that would give you and us the least necessary inconvenience, and again suggest that we promptly try to arrive at a settlement and come to an agreement as to the time for moving out.
